

Guy Chamberlain
Associate Superintendent for Auxiliary Services

Guy Chamberlain is associate superintendent for auxiliary services for Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools, a position he has held since November 2005. He was born and raised in suburban Washington, D.C. and graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy with a degree in Aerospace Engineering in 1973. He subsequently served in various tours with the Navy's Civil Engineer Corps, including positions as a transportation officer at the Charleston Naval Shipyard, officer in charge of construction for airfield projects on the Indian Ocean island of Diego Garcia, executive officer of Seabee Battalion 133 in Okinawa, Japan, assistant public works officer at the Washington Navy Yard, and director of public works at the Louisville Naval Ordinance Station.

After leaving the Navy, he served as the capital program manager and director of facility planning for the Gwinnett County Public Schools in Georgia for nearly eight years. He was responsible for the planning, design and financial management of over \$700 million in school construction projects, including 33 new schools and 42 major renovation projects.

In 2001, he assumed the position of assistant superintendent for building services for the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School System. In 2005, he was promoted to the position of associate superintendent for auxiliary services, where he is responsible for construction, facility management, transportation, child nutrition, inventory and distribution, safety, and graphic production. During his tenure at CMS he has managed over \$1.2 billion in school construction projects, including 34 new schools, 17 replacement schools and 45 major renovations.

He is active in Boy Scouting, and is on the Board of Directors for the Greater Carolinas Chapter of the American Red Cross and the Southeast Chapter of Design Build Institute of America. He is a registered Professional Engineer in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

He is married to Louise Burchett from Lebanon, Tennessee and they have two sons in CMS.
